

Casting Director's Report:

In the Upper Midwest Council, we have casual casting learning opportunities available on Thursday evenings in Duluth, MN. Todd Heggestad ,who is a Certified Casting Instructor (CCI), is holding informal sessions at Homecroft Elementary School in Duluth starting at 6:30 p.m. and lasting until about 8:00 p.m. for fly casting development. Casting Improvement Tip:

Thankfully, we are now in the fishing season time of year! Many of you are getting out to fish and are most likely trying, at times, to increase your distance on some of your casts. One flaw that commonly occurs when trying to achieve more distance is to "punch the cast" on the delivery. This extra effort to cast farther often results in a "Tailing Loop" which is likely to ruin that cast's presentation. That is because the extra punch at the end of the delivery cast causes the tip of the rod to dip down and bounce back up again making the line tail and can cause knots in your leader. It is better to trust that your cast will go well without that extra punch and deliver a clean cast without the tailing loop and all its problems.

This is a short synopsis of some of the conservation issues the FFI and conservation committee have been working on. While this is just a small summary of all the important conservation issues, I encourage everyone to visit the FFI web-site to see the full menu of all the work being done. As you look through all the projects and courses of action you may find an area that interests you enough to volunteer in! Volunteers are the life blood for many projects and without this "boots on the groundwork" many efforts would not get done. Please consider helping where you can.

Public Lands and Waters Issues:

Conservation of the fishes and their habitats is fundamental to preserving our opportunities to fly fish. These landscapes collectively exist under ownership laws and public land policies. They provide essential homes to a vast variety of wildlife, plant and insect species. Many are threatened or endangered with extinction. What must not be forgotten is that these very landscapes of minerals, waters, and plants are vital to our own quality of life as human habitat. They provide our fresh air and clean water. They sequester the carbons we emit into the atmosphere.

Clearly, protection of these natural landscapes is significant in many regards. They serve as habitat for many species of fish and wildlife. **Critical Habitat** for some and contribute to our preservation of the "Fly Fishing Legacy". Preservation of these millions of acres of diverse and healthy plant communities will assure that they will continue to do what only plants can do, capture and store carbon in their processing of clean air and water.

3/14/2023— Senate Leadership — Letter to Senators Schumer and McConnell urging opposition to Joint Resolutions 27 and 7 that would revise current definitions of Waters of the United States that would remove protection of small streams and wetlands under the provisions of the Clean Water Protection Act.

3/9/2023— Letter to Georgia Department of Natural Resources — Letter of "public comment" regarding an 8,000 acre sand mine operation near the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge and Wilderness in SE Georgia and NE Florida.

3/1/2023 — Bureau of Land Management — Public comments regarding development of a Programmatic EIS to evaluate Solar Energy Planning for an amended Resource Management Plan for Renewable Energy Development on BLM lands.
