

A Day on the Mississippi River for Smallmouth

The Lew Jewett Fly Fishers had a recent presentation from David Holmes about fishing the Mississippi River for small mouth bass. I enjoyed his presentation as I am still learning to fish for small mouth and learning to fish the Mississippi River. He mentioned moving up or down on the river depending on where the fish are biting. My friend and club member Peter Garretson hired David and invited Wendy Bennis and myself along. We met upstream from Little Falls. IT was one of those cold days of late spring. It was overcast, windy and only 40 degrees. On the way I crossed the Platte River which originates in Platte Lake where our family cabin is. I'm thinking I can come back and fish this area in the future.

David has a new jet boat with lots of flat surfaces to stand on. It made it easy for the three of us to fish from. The weather began at 40 degrees and was windy. It did not get much warmer. We brough our fly rods. David had spinning rods as well. Peter and I began with fly rods but between the wind and the trees we gave up on them early. Peter was the first to land a bass. It is not surprising since he is much more experienced than Wendy or I. We each caught before moving on to another location.

David's jet boat moved across shallow water quickly. We ran down the river to an area with many islands to fish around. With each new spot we all caught fish. Sometime two fish at once as evident by the photos. While getting the first fish ready for the photo Peter's line dropped into the water and another fish bite. Wendy Caught the biggest bass. Monta caught the most species: Bass, Rock bass, norther and a walleye. We brought our own lunches and had a pleasant lunch out of the wind. After we fished a little more constantly catching bass. It was a surprisingly good day with poor weather. I guess the company and quality of the guide can make all the difference. I must admitted I have not fished with a spinning rod in a long time and had to relearn how to cast.

We enjoyed the small group and all got to know each other a little better.

Roll Casts and Slack Line Presentations

Most of you already know that you cannot make a cast well with slack in the line. The reason for this is that much of the casting stroke is used to remove the slack rather than moving the end of the fly line and the fly. At the same time, you probably also know that a slack line presentation will help you to have a drag free float of your fly when it is on the water. There are two things about the Roll Cast that can help you with both issues.

- 1) When you have slack line on the water and you want to make the next cast, you usually need to strip in the line to remove the slack. This wastes precious time, especially when the fish are actively rising. If you strip the in the line, thereby shortening the line needed to get back to the fish, you will need to shoot line or make a few false casts to get your fly back to the fish. My suggestion is that you will find that by simply setting up a roll cast you will remove all the slack thereby getting your fly back on the water quickly to the rising fish. You will find that moving the rod back to the roll cast set up will remove slack from the line on water and not shorten the line length needed to get back the fish you are fishing for. No waste of time.
- 2) Because the delivery portion of the roll cast is like every other overhead cast, you can make a slack line presentation to the fish using a roll cast. After your loop has formed on your delivery, you can wiggle your rod tip to put waves in your line on the water, impart an ariel mend or make a reach mend. This will put slack into your presentation and allow your fly to float drag free rather than being pulled by the fly line on the water.

Try these two features of the roll cast the next time you are fishing; I think you will enjoy the results.

We had our annual trout outing on Thursday April 24th. Only three club members attended. I presume because of the predicted rain and it was a week day. We met at the Driftless Fly Fishing Company. It was a cool morning but there was no rain yet. From there we caravaned to a nearby trout stream. We warmed up our casting and began to fish. The fish were not cooperating. There were a few risers in a difficult stretch of the stream otherwise none were biting what we offered.

The forecast changed at the last minute to hold the rain off until 2 pm. We moved on to another stream. We ate our lunches and received a tour of Andre's camper van. Initially, we had a few bites but misses on nymphs at the end of our drifts. Occasionally a fish would break the surface but not take a dry fly. We decided to hike up the stream where there is a beautiful long run into a deep pool next to a cliff. We fished a few runs with small holes on the way up. The wildflowers were very beautiful on the hike and the birds were singing. At the deep hole I caught a fish at the start of the hole. Jim Thorsen was working the riffle and run above, and Andre was working the middle of the pool to the end. No other fish were taken from the pool. Next, we fished the ripples and runs below the pool. I caught another fish on a soft hackle. When I only catch three fish all day it is a tough day to catch fish. The weather held out with only a brief sprinkle. Any day on the stream after a cold winter is a joy especially with club members who enjoyed being there.

This event is organized by the Gitche Gumee Chapter of Trout Unlimited and the Arrowhead Fly Fishers (UMC-FFI affiliated).
- There will be a BBQ starting at 4 p.m. (after the tournament) that's available to everyone! so even if you aren't going to enter the tournament, we would love to see you after the event!
- This is a paddle-only <u>fly-fishing tournament</u>.
 Bring a fly rod and your kayak, canoe, drift boat, raft, kick boat, SUP, or anything else (waders) that you can fish from and join us for one of our favorite events of the year!

- 1. **ENTRY FEE**: Entry fee for the Paddle The Pads event is \$30. Tickets may be purchased online at https:// gitchee-gumee-trout-unlimited.square.site/, or in person at the event. There will be no refunds unless the event is canceled due to weather. The tournament will start at 8 am and end at 4 pm.
- 2. **PARTICIPANTS AND ELIGIBILITY**: a. Participation is open to those 14 years of age or older. b. Participants in the Paddle the Pads event waive their legal right to hold the provider legally responsible for any injuries of damages resulting from risks inherent in the sport or recreation opportunity.
- 3. **SAFETY:** Safety is paramount, and anglers must recognize that; Fishing from an open boat is inherently dangerous. We seek to limit those hazards with reasonable safety rules. a. Safe boat conduct must always be observed by competitors. Anglers must realize that riding in an open boat is inherently dangerous, and all safety precautions must be followed. b. Tournament officials may delay, shorten, restrict tournament waters, or cancel the start of an official tournament day due to bad weather or other factors that would endanger the safety of the competitors. c. In an emergency, competitors should call 911 immediately and notify tournament officials.
- 4. **SPORTSMANSHIP/CODE OF CONDUCT**: Anglers participating in the Paddle the Pads event shall observe this code of conduct and the applicable rules for the specific event in which he/she is participating. Anglers shall always professionally conduct themselves. Competitors are expected to follow high standards of sportsmanship, courtesy, safety, and conservation. Maximum courtesy must always be practiced, especially regarding boating and angling near non-competitors. a. Laws: All competitors are bound by the prevailing statutes and regulations of the state(s) within which the tournament is being held, which includes a valid fishing license.

- 5. **TACKLE AND EQUIPMENT**: This is a fly-fishing tournament. Participants must use fly rods, fly reels, fly lines, and artificial flies. No "live bait" or "prepared bait" is permitted during the competition. Only one rod and reel combination may be used at one time. All bass must be caught live and in a conventional sporting manner. a. Exceptions: Anglers can use spinning gear, but will not be eligible for prizes.
- 6. **WATERCRAFT** No motors are allowed during the tournament. Acceptable watercraft include kayaks, canoes, rafts, drift boats, pack rafts, belly boats, or other non-motorized watercraft. a. Exceptions: Motors may be used by a participant (if approved by a tournament official) for any participant who prefers to use one. That participant will not be eligible for prizes. b. Participants with trailers may launch their watercraft at the Fond Du Lac Campground or at Boyscout Landing. Fond Du Lac Campground has limited parking available and charges \$5 for access to their boat launch.
- 7. **SCORING:** This is the longest bass (smallmouth bass, largemouth bass) tournament. Anglers will receive a tape measure during the morning of the fishing tournament. Any bass caught must have a picture taken with the tape measure and a unique identifier that clearly shows the length of the fish. All fish must be immediately released after a picture is taken. Pictures can be texted to 406-390-4150 along with the participant's name or your fish pictures can be shown to the judge at the end of the tournament.
- 8. PRIZES: a. Tournament prizes will be provided to the top 3 anglers with the longest bass.
